ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Since the first term of the Sayegh Administration, the City has secured nearly \$1 billion in economic development projects. This includes new major developments, as well as restoring some of Paterson's most historic landmarks and public parks.

HINCHLIFFE STADIUM: THE NEW JERSEY JACKALS BASEBALL TEAM'S NEW HOME



The New Jersey Jackals, a member of the Frontier League - a professional baseball league consisting of 16 teams and a partner league to the Major League Baseball (MLB) will be relocating to the historic Hinchliffe Stadium. Preserving Paterson's historical landmarks and increasing tourist attractions have been a top priority for Mayor Sayegh. The restoration of Hinchliffe Stadium - one of the nation's last standing monuments to host Negro League Baseball games and the Jackals relocating there achieves just that! Owner of the Jackals, Al Dorso, who was born and raised in Paterson, in reference to the move stated, "This is a great opportunity at the right time in my life to give back and add to the rich history of this region. More importantly, we have approached this effort with a community-first mindset, starting with working with Mayor Sayegh and other local

officials and business leaders which we plan to expand to create a true ecosystem of opportunity in the months and years ahead." The Jackals will begin its first season at Hinchliffe in May 2023.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING: RIVERSIDE TERRACE

Mayor André Sayegh alongside Congressman Bill Pascrell, Jr., Irma Gorham, Executive Director of the Paterson Housing Authority, Israel Roizman, project developer/owner of Roizman Development, Inc., and members of the Paterson City Council celebrated the grand opening of Riverside Terrace which includes the Riverside Village Family and the Riverside Village Senior Apartments. This \$92 million project features 245 affordable housing units for seniors and families. Amenities include classrooms, a basketball court, a children's room, and a community building. Additionally, there are townhouse-style units, lounge areas, an outdoor patio, and garden space. The Paterson Housing Authority will also provide social service programs on-site to residents in need.



PATERSON ALLOCATES \$5.7 MILLION TO RENOVATE PARKS

The City of Paterson allocated American Rescue Plan (ARP) funding to renovate parks throughout each of Paterson's six wards. Announced by Mayor André Sayegh, Congressman Bill Pascrell, Jr., and Assemblyman Benjie Wimberly, this nearly \$ 6 million investment will be utilized to repair turf surfaces, fencing, and trails, and install bleachers and lighting in efforts to increase visibility and safety. In addition, new infiltration systems and lifequard stands will be installed at two city pools.

Parks that will be improved by this investment include Commons Field, Tyrone Collins Park, Cobbs Park, Buckley Park, Westside Park, Eastside Park, Anthony Lucas Park, Barbour Park, Roberto Clemente Park, and Alabama Ave/Trenton Ave. The pools that will be renovated are Riverside Vets Pool and Lou Costello Pool.



SMALL BUSINESS WALK-THROUGH

Senator Cory Booker joined Mayor André Sayegh to conduct a small business walk-through in South Paterson. This commercial corridor has undergone major improvements and became vibrant for economic development. This timely visit occurred one day prior to the Senator urging the United States Small Business Administration to make its core loan programs and entrepreneurial development services more accessible especially to individuals impacted by the criminal justice system.

PUBLIC SAFETY

PATERSON COMMUNITY COURT

The U.S. Department of Justice through their 2022 Community Courts Initiative Grants Program awarded the City of Paterson \$600,000 to establish and operate a community court program within the Paterson Municipal Court. Spearheaded by Mayor Sayegh, the Paterson City Council, and Corporation Counsel Aymen Aboushi as a part of collective efforts to implement rehabilitative approaches to quality-of-life issues in Paterson, the Community Court will serve residents and offenders who have been charged with low-level, non-violent crimes. Alternative sanctions will be tailored to an individual's needs including access to mental health and primary care, health education, job training and placement, substance abuse treatment, community services benefits, and housing assistance. Additionally, the City plans to implement a hybrid approach to connecting defendants to substance abuse treatment and other social services by hiring dedicated, in-house case managers who can provide direct support and referrals to contracting community-based organizations and treatment providers. The City anticipates serving 125 defendants per quarter for a total of 1,750 throughout the implementation phase of the grant.

ILLEGAL VEHICLE ORDINANCE AND OPERATION CONFISCATION



Mayor Sayegh signed a local ordinance that bans the use of All Terrain Vehicles (ATVs), dirt bikes, minibikes, snowmobiles, etc. Passed by the members of the Paterson City Council, after several complaints from residents, this ordinance allows the City to cease and destroy confiscated property. Issues with illegal vehicles include reckless driving, lack of automotive insurance, and operating unsafe vehicles on city roads.



This local legislation was passed and signed following the Paterson Police Department's launch of "Operation Confiscation." Through this initiative, several illegal vehicles have been confiscated which has also led to arrests, confiscation of illicit drugs and the incarceration of lawbreakers, which all keeps our streets safer.

PASSAGE OF BAIL REFORM LEGISLATION

Since the summer of 2021, Mayor Sayegh has called for the passage of legislation to reform the New Jersey Criminal Justice Reform Act to keep offenders who commit violent gun crimes incarcerated and off the streets until trial. In the summer of 2022, the bill was passed and signed into law. This feat would not have been possible without the many allies who collectively showed statewide bi-partisan support for this bill including but not limited to fellow Mayors, the Garden State Initiative, NJ Sheriff's Association, and State legislators such as bill sponsors Assemblyman Benjie Wimberly and Senator Joseph Cryan.

GUN VIOLENCE AWARENESS DAY

On National Gun Violence Awareness Day, Mayor Sayegh held a walkout to stand in support and solidarity with the victims of gun violence and their friends and families. He was joined by Paterson Public School Superintendent Eileen Shafer, Corporation Counsel Aymen Aboushi, Director of Policy and Planning Ishiya Hayes, and Ivernis Santiago mother of the late Robert Cuadra, a promising Paterson student who was sadly caught in the crossfire of a shooting.



During the walkout Mayor Sayegh signed a declaration to recognize Gun Violence Awareness Day in Paterson and vowed to continue to implement policies, programs, and practices to increase public safety in the city.

GROUNDBREAKING ON COMMUNICATIONS CENTER



Mayor André Sayegh, joined by city leaders, held a groundbreaking on Paterson's new \$6 million Communications Center. The site will streamline emergency calls and serve as home to the Emergency Dispatch Center, which will include 15 active high-tech dispatch consoles, a training room, supervision offices, a decompression area for the city's dispatchers, and American Disabilities Act accessibility. The building will also house the Office of Emergency Management, Fire/EMS, DPW, Health, Administration, and outside

agencies like the American Red Cross. The Center will be the hub for emergency logistics, storing large-scale incident supplies like surgical masks, Haz-Mat suits,

gloves, post-fire recovery kits, mass casualty kits, emergency blankets, sanitary supplies, and more. Fire Chief Brian McDermott leads the project with support from Public Safety Director Jerry Speziale, Acting Police Chief Bert Ribeiro, Information Technology Director Ryan Foote, Economic Development Director Michael Powell, and Community Development Director Barbara Blake Mclennon.



HONORING PATERSON'S MUNICIPAL CLERK WITH KEY TO THE CITY



After 28 years of service former Paterson Municipal Clerk Sonia Gordon retired from her position. Madam Clerk initially began her career in the City in 1995 starting as the Assistant to the Municipal Clerk and Paterson City Council, she rose to the position of Deputy Clerk in 2001, Acting Clerk in 2014, and ultimately was appointed to Municipal Clerk in 2016. In recognition of her major contributions, Mayor Sayegh along with members of the Paterson City Council honored the first Jamaican-born Municipal Clerk with the Key to the City - Paterson's highest honor.

Ms. Gordon played an integral role in the City of Paterson as she served as a chief administrative officer in all local elections, acted as secretary to the municipal corporation and the governing body, and was the liaison between the executive and the general body of municipal personnel. In addition, she was a stellar archivist as she retained the original copies of all ordinances and resolutions, prepared agendas for and attended all City Council meetings, and was the issuing officer for licenses and permits. Her contributions to the City of Paterson were endless.

Pictured alongside her daughter and Mayor Sayegh, Ms. Gordon stated that she was going to miss working as Municipal Clerk and seeing all of her colleagues, however she looked forward to her retirement to spend more time with her family.

Larry Doby became the first African American to play in baseball's American League (AL) on July 5th, 1947. To commemorate the 75th anniversary of Doby breaking AL's color barrier, the City of Paterson and the Paterson Division of Recreation hosted a celebration in Larry Doby Field at Eastside Park.

Organized by Director of Community Engagement Della Fischer, many joined Mayor Sayegh at the event to celebrate the legacy of this hometown hero including Congressman Bill Pascrell, Jr., Assemblyman Benjie Wimberly, Councilwoman Ruby Cotton, Councilwoman Dr. Lilisa Mims, Larry Doby Jr., redeveloper Baye Adofo-Wilson, and countless others including Paterson youth.



To continue the celebration long past the event attendees received Larry Doby memorabilia including posters, hats, shirts, and a booklet on his life and contributions to the American League.

WOMEN'S EQUALITY DAY

On Women's Equality Day, Mayor Sayegh joined with Senator Nellie Pou, Councilwoman Dr. Lilisa Mims, Councilwoman Ruby Cotton, Councilwoman Maritza Davila, Lauren Nance, Voter Services Chair for the League of Women Voters of Paterson, women directors and staff from Paterson City Hall, and other distinguished guests hosted a voter registration drive and press conference to call for women's equality. This event commemorated the passage of the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution which granted women the right to vote.

Senator Pou called attention to \$247, legislation she co-sponsored and introduced in early 2022. The bill if passed would reduce the standard voter registration dead-line to eight days before an election, allow voter registration at polling places on election day and offices where mail-in ballots are
