FIRST STEPS

- Call the school district with questions about your child's school
- Find out what day classes start and what time your child should arrive
- ☐ Enroll your child (if she is not already registered from the previous year)
- Fill out emergency contact sheets and any other required forms

CHECK MEDICAL REQUIREMENTS

- ☐ Make sure your child has all required immunizations
- Schedule a physical exam for your child if needed to participate in school activities
- ☐ Get your child's vision checked before school starts if he is due for an exam
- Notify the principal's office, the school nurse, and your child's teachers about any health problems or medications

STOCK UP ON SCHOOL SUPPLIES

- Check the school website or call for a list of required supplies
- ☐ Find out whether students will store supplies at school or bring them home each day
- ☐ Buy a backpack or bag to carry daily items
- ☐ Review the school dress code
- ☐ Buy school uniforms and gym clothes, if necessary

LEARN ABOUT THE SCHOOL

- ☐ Find out whether the teacher prefers to communicate by phone, e-mail, or written note
- Know what your child is expected to learn in her grade level
- ☐ Familiarize yourself with the information on the school website
- □ Note the phone numbers for checking school closures or reporting absences
- ☐ Find out the procedure for taking your child out of school early
- ☐ Read the school handbook and make sure your child understands the rules
- ☐ Review the school's federal "report card"

PLAN TO BE INVOLVED

- ☐ Mark school events on the family calendar
- ☐ Attend the back-to-school program
- ☐ Schedule and attend parent-teacher conferences
- ☐ Meet leaders of the parent-teacher group

PLAN HEALTHY MEALS

- ☐ Have nutritious food on hand for breakfast and after-school snacks
- ☐ Find out how much school breakfasts and lunches
- ☐ Find out whether snacks and drinks are available at school or can be brought from home
- ☐ Ask where to obtain weekly school lunch menus
- ☐ Alert school staff if your child has a severe food allergy

ARRANGE TRANSPORTATION

- Practice getting to school with your child
 - BUS: Make sure she knows where and when to be picked up before and after school
 - BICYCLE: Review road safety and make sure he has a helmet
 - ON FOOT: Walk the route together and review pedestrian safety guidelines
- Arrange a carpool if necessary and introduce your child to the other adults and children
- Compile contact information of parents who can pick up your child in an emergency

MAKE AFTER-SCHOOL PLANS

- ☐ Arrange child care or after-school activities
- Choose extracurricular activities carefully to avoid overscheduling
- Make sure your child knows where to go after school each day

HELP YOUR CHILD PREPARE FOR SCHOOL

- Arrange for your child to play with others in his age group before classes start
- ☐ Discuss your child's feelings about starting school and talk over any concerns
- □ Talk with your child about her daily school schedule
- ☐ Talk about peer pressure with your child
- ☐ Have your child memorize your home address and home and work phone numbers
- ☐ Tour the school with your child so she can find her classrooms, the restrooms, and the cafeteria
- Arrange a time for you and your child to meet his new teachers

LAY THE GROUND RULES

- ☐ Establish a firm bedtime before school starts
- Determine where and when your child will do homework
- ☐ Figure out a plan for balancing homework and play time
- Set rules for the time spent on TV, video games, and computer use for non-school projects





New Jersey Sharing Network

Our Mission Statement

Through organ and tissue donation and transplantation, the New Jersey Organ and Tissue Sharing Network (NJ Sharing Network) saves lives, gives hop, and restores physical funtion.

NJ Sharing Network is also dedicated to educating the public about the benefits of donation and transplantation and supporting both donor families and transplant recipients.

Who We Are

NJ Sharing Network is a non-profit, federally-certified, state-approved organ procurement organization responsible for the recovery of organs and tissue for the 4,300 New Jersey residents currently awaiting transplantation, and is part of the national recovery system, which is in place for the nearly 100,000 people on waiting lists.

Our History

On June 1, 1987, three New Jersey organ procurement organizations merged into one, and NJ Sharing Network was formed. In November of that year, the state and federal governments passed the Required Request/Assured Option legislation, which requires hospitals to offer the donation option to families of potential donors. Since that time, NJ Sharing Network has set out to educate the general public as to the life-saving benefits of transplantation with the goal of increasing the number of organ donors.

What We Do

Since it was founded, NJ Sharing Network more than quadrupled the total number of organs recovered in New Jersey for transplantation. NJ Sharing Network also recovers tissue for life-enhancing transplants. NJ Sharing Network continues to reach New Jerseyans through educational tools and the media to inform them of the option to donate and of the benefits of transplantation. Having been exposed to this information, New Jerseyans can discuss this issue with their families and make the personal decision to register to be an organ donor.

Additionally, NJ Sharing Network offers a Donor Family Support Division, which provides care during and after a donor family's active hospital experience. The division also addresses unique issues related to seeking consent for organ and tissue donation.



NJ Sharing Network enlists a large base of volunteers through its community outreach program. These volunteers regularly help educate the public about organ donation and transplantation by participating in community events, speaking at houses of worship and civic organizations, and encouraging local organizations and businesses to display donor registry brochures, donor cards and information.

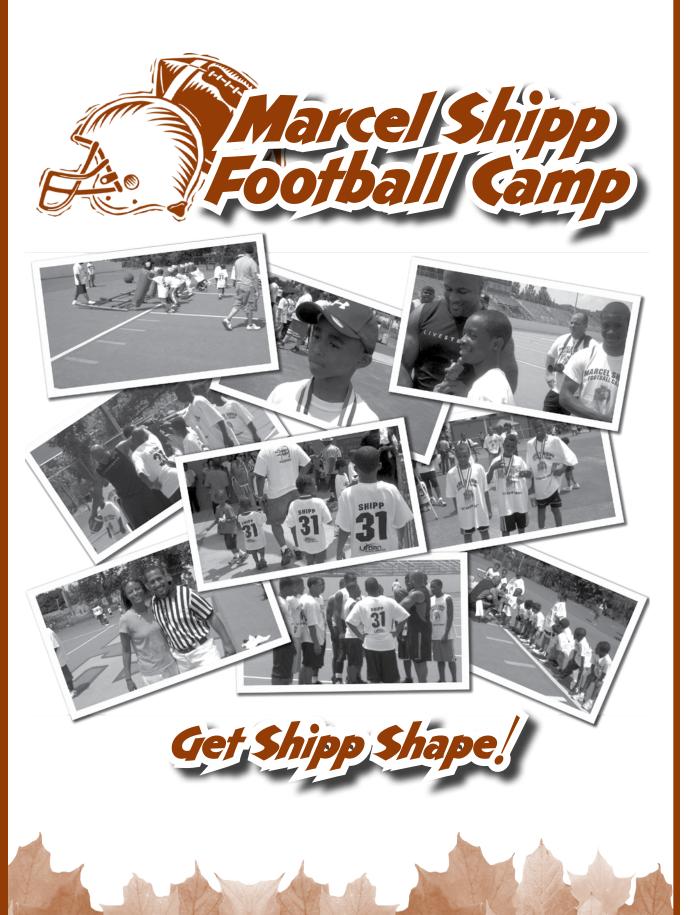

To become an organ and/or tissue donor you should:

Make it a license to save lives. Make the donor designation on your New Jersey driver license or ID card. The words "Organ Donor" will appear on the front of your license and will be included in your computer record with the Motor Vehicle Commission.

If you are under the age of 18 or are unable to obtain a New Jersey Driver License or State ID for any reason, you can also sign and carry an *organ donor card*. Please note that while the donor card allows you to legally express your wishes, it must be accessible at the time of your passing as it is not connected to any registry. If you are not a New Jersey resident, please visit *www.donatelifeamerica. net* to find your state registry.

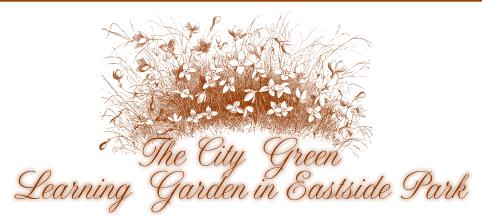

This summer at the City Green Learning Garden in Eastside Park, City Green ran a garden program called "Me and My Environment". Over the course of the summer the young gardeners were asked to explore their surrounding Environment and Community through a series of thought provoking questions, hands-on Gardening experiences and Crafting. Youth from the City of Paterson's Eastside Park Day Camp visited the garden weekly for two hours to tend the garden, plant and harvest vegetables, enjoy crafts and learn how they could make their world a better place. Fridays the program was open to the public. City Green hosted over 120 youth gardeners weekly this summer!

Included in the program were lessons on community, ecosystems, cultures and food. One of the highlights of the summer program was the "City Green Salad Bar" activity, in which youth gardeners harvested, washed and prepped the vegetables they grew to make a salad, which they ate together in the Story Grove. We always find that children are very willing to eat vegetables when they've grown and picked them themselves. "I want to eat salad every day", was one comment by an enthusiastic gardener!

Another highlight of our summer was the City Green "Green Market" run by our six high school interns. These students harvested the vegetables, prepared them for the market, created the displays and signs and sold the vegetables to customers. It was a great learning experience for them all, as they gained insight into what it takes to prepare for market, advertise and handle customers.

City Green ran similar satellite garden programs at the YWCA, the Boys and Girls Club, the Paterson Library main branch, and St. Paul's Community Development Center. Each of these locations has their own garden, which City Green grows with the children of the program. All produce is sent home with gardeners to share with their families.

This fall at the Learning Garden, look for our Green Your Block! and Back Yard Gardener Workshops. We will be teaching community members about fall bulb planting, shrub pruning, and fall vegetables to plant. DON'T BE SCARED - BE PREPARED

Worried about H1N1 flu (aka "swine flu")? At the moment, it's not a serious threat to most people and symptoms are no different from regular flu. But even regular flu is no fun. Fortunately, with flu, a little preparation — and prevention — can go a long way in protecting your health.

Here are things you can do.

PROTECT YOURSELF — AND OTHERS

- Wash your hands with plenty of soap and warm water for 15 to 20 seconds, especially at key times like after being around people who are sick or before eating.
- **»** Carry an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with you and use it often.
- **»** Avoid touching your face especially your eyes, nose, or mouth.
- » Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you sneeze or cough, and wash your hands or use a hand sanitizer afterward. Sneeze or cough into your sleeve if you don't have a tissue handy.
- ➤ Throw tissues away immediately after using them don't leave them lying around.
- Stay home if you're sick.
- Stand 6 feet or more away from other people if they're sick or have been around others who are.
- » On the bus (or in a car), sit near an open window.
- Get plenty of sleep, exercise, and eat healthy foods to keep your immune system strongnow's the time to be sure you get your five servings a day!

GET THE SWINE FLU VACCINE

The swine flu vaccine is different from the regular flu shot. It will be available in the United States this fall — probably mid-October. The swine flu vaccine may be given in two doses. If that's the case, you'll need to go back for a follow-up shot 3 weeks after the first. It takes a couple of weeks after the second shot for a person to build up immunity.

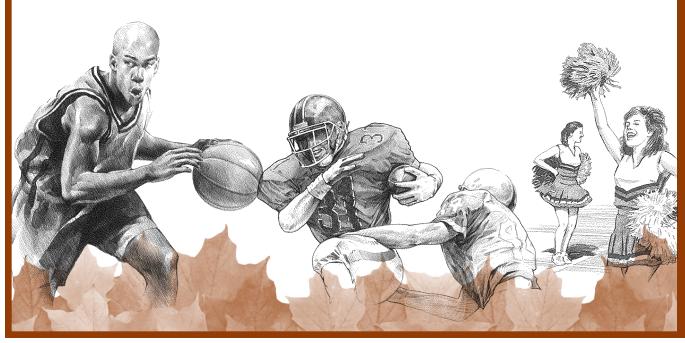
Why get vaccinated? Swine flu has affected kids and teens more than seasonal flu does. There's also a chance the virus could mutate and become stronger this winter. So experts recommend that all teens get the vaccine when it becomes available.
